It was also the year in which James Joyce's Ulysses and T.S. Eliot's The Waste Land were published, Alfred Hitchcock directed his first feature, the Ottoman Empire collapsed, Louis Armstrong brought jazz from New Orleans to Chicago, and in Hollywood Will Hays took command of what would become the Motion Picture Association of America. Cultural critic Kevin Jackson conducts an entertaining and enlightening journey through the diaries of the actors, anthropologists, artists, dancers, designers, film-makers, philosophers, playwrights, politicians, and scientists whose lives and works made 1922 the beginning of a new era.
