Kuckayokana, given as Kuskakanadi in line 26; KUckanadi in line 30; and Kuckana in line 35, archaic names for the opossum, now called hcixha yoka, swamp hog. This last name confirms the suspicion that yoka, in Kuckayokana, means swamp; if so, the first name may be rendered the Ancient of Swamp Opossums, and Kuk-aka-na, the Ancient of Younger Opossums (a ka, in kinship terms being younger).
