

Hypermature Stage.--The cataract may continue in the mature stage for a long time. If changes continue, the surface of the lens loses its radial markings and becomes homogeneous, or presents irregular spots. The cataract may continue to lose water, and thus a shrunken, dry, flattened mass results (shrunken cataract), with some deepening of the anterior chamber. Or, the cortex may become soft, liquid, and milky, and the nucleus sink to the bottom of this fluid (Morgagnian cataract), the cataract appearing white with a brownish coloring...
