The retail prices of these commodities have followed the wholesale decline much more closely than the prices of groceries. Consumers certainly have little cause for complaint with regard to these two principal vegetables, as retail prices are in many instances below the cost of production. Hothouse vegetables do not and cannot show any such reduction, in view of excessive fuel costs at greenhouses. Meats. Prices of meats reached their maximum in the spring and early summer of 1920, beef selling above \$27 per hundred in Boston. At this time good cattle were scarce, wages were still steady and demand was brisk. Within a few months the other extreme was reached. Credit was curtailed, cattlemen were forced to sell heavily, wages declined, the public diminished its buying, stocks increased and prices fell. In December, 1920, prices of...
