With the beginning of this century, this topic was reformulated into the concept of 'the responsibility to protect', thus shifting the debate from the viewpoint of the interveners to that of the people in peril. The responsibility to protect is a new and controversial issue in many intellectual and political spheres. While some believe that the use of military force as a last resort should not be avoided when it can alleviate or stop large-scale human-rights violations, others hold that any military intervention, even for humanitarian purposes, can only lead to a worsening of the situation. In April 2005, the WCC's Commission of the Churches on International Affairs (CCIA) organised a high-level seminar aimed at advising the WCC on this issue both from a theological and ethical stand, as well as from political perspectives.
